HISTORIC POWELTON



In the March, 2010 "On the West Side" a piece on "Mapping Poweltonians" introduced Doug Ewbank and some of his initial research on historic Powelton Village, its architecture and the people who occupied the homes and properties in this **University City** neighborhood. It focused on an interactive map located at www.poweltonvillage.org (Click on "history" then on "interactive property map" which provides a "finger pointer" for some 350 houses for which research findings, including old photographs, about the property, and drawn from about three censuses, about the people who knew the house together with their relationships).

At the end of that introductory piece, we promised to provide you with an extended version of Doug's presentation, which will occur on Saturday, June 5, from 4:30 to 6 pm, for UCHS members and the general public when Doug and his partner, **Scott Ryder**, give an extended version of their exploration of "The People of Powelton Village in the 19th Century: Their Homes and Their Businesses" which they describe as follows:

"From its beginning in 1860, Powelton Village was the home of many Philadelphia businessmen who

were attracted by large lots, tree-lined streets and easy access to center city. They were bankers, insurance company executives, small business owners, and captains of industry.

The presentation will explore the reasons they chose Powelton. The presentation will include pictures of their homes and businesses, brief biographies and discussions of their role in Philadelphia society. We will include brief discussions of the architectural styles their homes reflect.

The presentation will include two prominent Powelton families: the Wilsons and the Sellers. Wilson Brothers & Co. was one of the most prominent architectural and engineering firms in the country. Their output included such prominent buildings as the **Drexel Institute**, several buildings for the Centennial Exposition, and the Reading Terminal Headhouse. We include photos above of the W. H. Wilson House at 3501 Powelton Avenue, their family home, and below the B. K. Jamison House at 3912 Walnut Street, one of several other homes they designed and built in Powelton and West

Philadelphia, some, like these, which are no longer standing.

There were two branches of the Sellers family living in Powelton. Both were inventors and



manufacturers. We will discuss some of their major accomplishments and show pictures of their homes (some no longer standing), their businesses, and the

products that made them famous. The list of other families we will discuss includes **the Poths** (brewing), **the Du Ponts** (chemicals), **Alexander Brothers** (industrial belting) and **the Pughs** (drilling bits)."

This free presentation, followed by some light refreshments, will take place in the main sanctuary of **St. Andrew'S and St. Monica's Church** at **36**th & **Baring Street** in Powelton Village, with plenty of space to accommodate all who come to what should be a fascinating excursion into some truly significant local history.

Douglas Ewbank and Scott Ryder have lived at 315 N. 35th Street in Powelton Village since 1993. Dr. Ewbank is Emeritus Research Professor at the Population Studies Center, University of Pennsylvania. One of his research areas is the demographic history of the U.S. from 1800-1940. In addition to collecting most of the information now included in the interactive map, he has written more than a dozen short pieces on the history of Powelton for the *Powelton Post* which can be seen at: http://www.poweltonvillage.org/ Powelton_Post-bios/PostItems.htm. Scott Ryder is trained in art and architectural history. He works as a consultant to individuals and interior decorators on the arrangement and display of private art collections. He is Chairman of the Powelton Village Historic Preservation Committee.

INTERNSHIP

SEARCH

Impressed with this Powelton research intiative, UCHS is searching for an intern to do further research under the direction of members of the UCHS Board, along with Doug Ewing & Scott Ryder, some of which would be added to "The Powelton Village Interactive Map" (see: http://poweltonvillage.org/PVIMap.html) which combines

an architectural inventory and a social history of Powelton Village. The basic map image is from the **1927 Bromley Atlas** of the **24th Ward of Philadelphia** with structures torn down before 1927 shown as red boxes. The information page for each structure offers census data and biographies with links to sources, previous and subsequent addresses of the occupants, and neighboring houses.

The research would also begin updating a 1984 Inventory of houses in Powelton Village, completed as part of Powelton's application to become a National Register Historic District. This would include a more accurate dating of each structure and describing its important architectural features. It might also involve a variety of tasks such as checking city directories to find the earliest resident of each house, checking the deed records, noting significant changes and collecting photographic evidence of the current state of each property.

Powelton Village is planning a special issue of the *Powelton Post* for September as part of the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the start of Powelton, and the research here could be published there and in UCHS's "On the West Side."

The intern would work for a period between 4 - 8 weeks this summer (depending on the number of hours/week) at \$15/hour, for a maximum stipend of \$2000.
